ORGAN CRAWL SUMMARY...

On Saturday, October 15, the Chemung Valley Chapter AGO plus several members of the Binghamton AGO, attended an organ crawl in Auburn, New York, featuring four churches and five organs. Eight attended the crawl.



The crawl began at St. Mary's Church, a huge edifice in downtown Auburn with fabulous acoustics and two historic organs. A Carl Barkoff from 1890, recently restored by Parsons Organ Company, resides in the rear balcony and an 1872 one manual Garrett House tracker, restored by David Fedor and David Jackson is in the front of the church. Both instruments were ably demonstrated by the resident organist, an Eastman graduate and native of Croatia.

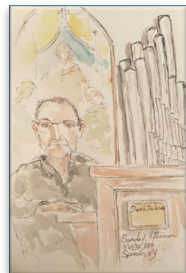
Next stop was Westminster Presbyterian, home of a 1926 E. M. Skinner. In the 1950's it was modified somewhat. Kerner and Merchant Organ Company from Syracuse have restored the organ completely and returned it to its original specifications.

After lunch, we went to St. Alphonsus Church, another building with fabulous acoustics. A 1930 Marr and Colton organ was located in the rear balcony. Marr and Colton basically was a theater organ builder but this organ was one of their few attempts to build a church organ. Judging from the amount of junk piled on the organ bench, it's likely the organ rarely gets used and was not in the best playing condition. It sounded quite grand however in the church.



Our last stop was St. Frances of Assisi, a modern A frame building containing a 1948 Aeolian - Skinner organ which had originally been in St John's Episcopal Church, Auburn. It was a small instrument with some delightful sounds.

Many thanks to David Lenington for arranging to see all these instruments and for doing beautiful color handouts about each of the organs and the churches they were in.

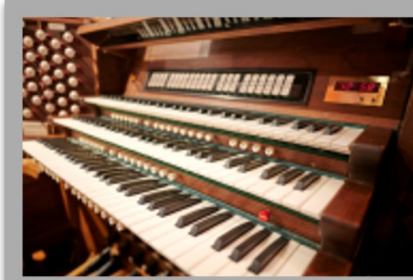

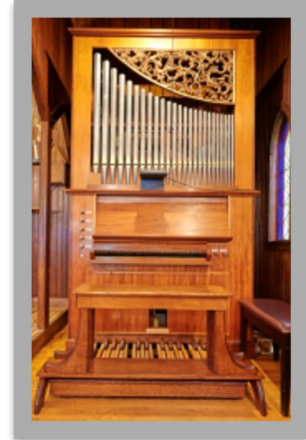
